Te Kaihīnaki / Moeraki Boulders



Walk amongst these striking round rocks which formed in ancient seafloor muds millions of years ago. Kāi Tahu whānui have long treasured these large and spherical boulders as the remains of the baskets, gourds and kumara washed ashore from the wreck of the famous Araiteuru waka (canoe).

Puketapu



Overlooking the township of Palmerston stands this impressive ancient volcano. Admire this landscape from the town or take the short, but steep climb to the top. You will be rewarded with stunning views! The track is open all year except during lambing season (Sept – Nov).
